

SOCIAL SECURITY SCOTLAND Guide to Information

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Introduction

The <u>Freedom of Information (Scotland) Act 2002</u> (the Act) and the associated Orders provide individuals with a right to request any recorded information held by Scotland's public authorities. Anyone can use this right, and information can only be withheld where the Act expressly permits it.

The Act requires Scottish public authorities to adopt and maintain a publication scheme. Authorities are under a legal obligation to:

- publish the classes of information that they make routinely available; and
- tell the public how to access the information they publish and whether information is available free of charge or on payment.

A class is a group of information having one or more common features such as subject or origin.

Social Security Scotland has adopted the <u>Model Publication Scheme</u> developed by the Scottish Information Commissioner. The Model Publication Scheme developed by the Commissioner can be viewed <u>online</u> or <u>by contacting us.</u>

Adoption of the Model Publication Scheme commits us to:

- using the Model Publication Scheme as its publication scheme, and accepting any updates to the Model Publication Scheme, without amendment;
- publishing the information, including environmental information, we hold which falls within the classes of information;
- ensuring that the way we publish information meets the Model Publication Scheme Principles;
- producing a Guide to Information which sets out:



- (a) the information the authority publishes through the Model Publication Scheme;
- (b) how to access it;
- (c) whether there is a charge for it; and
- (d) how to get help to access information.



Purpose

The purpose of this Guide to Information is to:

- allow the public to see what information is available (and what is not available) in relation to each class;
- state what charges may be applied;
- explain how to find the information easily;
- provide contact details for enquiries and to get help with accessing the information; and
- explain how to request information we hold that has not been published.



Social Security Scotland

Social Security Scotland is an Executive Agency of the Scottish Government. We started operating in September 2018. Our purpose is to administer the Scottish social security system effectively, in accordance with the principles in the <u>Social Security (Scotland) Act</u> 2018 and our <u>charter.</u>

As an Executive Agency, the Scottish Government's <u>"6 principles of Freedom of</u> <u>Information"</u>, underpin our approach to Freedom of Information matters. These principles, in particular, make clear the Scottish Government's commitment to open government and publishing information routinely whenever possible. We have also considered the types of information which are requested from Social Security Scotland routinely and, where possible, sought to publish information proactively.

We are working together with partners in the Scottish Government and beyond to deliver the benefits devolved to Scotland. Once fully working, the Scottish Government will directly deliver 16 benefits through Social Security Scotland. This includes five completely new forms of financial support.

Social Security Scotland will have a presence across Scotland to support individuals to access benefits. The head office is in Dundee and a further office is in Glasgow. Social Security Scotland are committed to publishing all information which we hold which falls within the classes of information in the scheme. The information we publish through the model scheme is, wherever possible, available on our website.

Dignity, fairness and respect are at the core of everything we do. We demonstrate these values by making our work as transparent and accountable as possible.

Availability and formats

The information we publish through the model scheme is, wherever possible, available on our website. We offer alternative arrangements for people who do not want to, or cannot, access the information online or by coming along to our premises. For example, we can usually arrange to send information to you in paper copy. Whilst we do not intend to charge for this, there may be a charge where the volumes requested or the time to prepare the information is more than reasonable. To request information in an alternative format you can contact us in a number of ways. These can be found later in this guide.

Exempt Information

All information published in this guide can be accessed either through our website, or by asking us for it.

Our aim in maintaining this publication scheme is to be as open as possible. You should note, however, that there may be limited circumstances where information will be withheld from publication. Information will only be withheld where the Act or, in the case of environmental information, the Environmental Information (Scotland) Regulations 2004 expressly permits it. For example, where the information's disclosure would breach the law of confidentiality, harm an organisation's commercial interests, or endanger the protection of the environment. Information may also be withheld if it is another person's personal information, and its release would breach the data protection legislation.

Where we withhold information we will remove it before publication and explain why.

Charges

In accordance with the social security principles that are set out in the first section of the Social Security (Scotland) Act 2018, we do not intend to charge for our publications where the cost incurred is reasonable in all the circumstances. If we consider the costs incurred not to be reasonable we may charge for providing information to you e.g. photocopying and postage, but we will charge you no more than it actually costs us to do so. We will always tell you what the cost is before providing the information to you.

If applying a charge, postage costs will be recharged at the rate we paid to send the information to you. When providing copies of pre-printed publications, we will charge no more than the cost per copy of the total print run. We do not pass on any other costs to you in relation to our published information.

Class 8: Our commercial publications

This class refers to information packaged and made available for sale on a commercial basis. Social Security Scotland holds no information under this class.

Class 9: Our Open Data

Open data made available by Social Security Scotland as described by the Scottish Government's <u>Open Data Resource Pack.</u> We publish Open Data as part of the Official Statistics Process.

Part of the Code of Practice for Official Statistics is the orderly release of statistics:

- Dates for Publication are pre-announced on the Scottish Government's forthcoming publications list at least one month in advance
- Statistics are released at 9:30 on a weekday



- Policy, press or ministerial statements referring are issued separately from, and contain a prominent link to, the source of statistics.
- High level data is published as official statistics 12 weeks after each benefit is launched
- The majority of our publications are quarterly
- Five star Open data is released within one month of the official statistics publication.

Data is published in the <u>five star</u> format on the open data publishing platform <u>https://statistics.gov.scot/home</u>.
